On August 11 we will kickoff the new One significant change in the coming year is that all children and teachers will begin each Sunday in the worship service. Greetings From the New Board President



Hello! I wanted to take this opportunity to greet the congregation as I have taken on the Board President role effective July.

First, I wanted to call out a big THANK YOU to Elizabeth Rohan for her amazing work over the last year as Board Presi-

dent. This is a tough job, but Elizabeth always handled things impressively and with UUMAN's best interests in mind, so THANK YOU! Also, a thank you to Laura Keck who served as Secretary and now makes way for Leslie Wolf as incoming Secretary.

I recognize there has a been quite a bit of change and heavy emotions over the last 6 weeks, so I wanted to address some top-of-mind items. First, the MCY Task Force is hard at work organizing and preparing for the Fall Youth Program. We will be Todd communicating updates from their work on an ongoing basis.

Second, the Interim DRE Search process has begun with the first step of discussions around creating a task force for the search. Once we begin the steps toward creating a search task force, we will solicit input and participation from the congregation to make sure all voices are heard, and we have a unified vision of what we are looking for. Our hope is to be able to bring on an Interim DRE in January, so we work diligently and expeditiously with that goal in mind.

We had updated the congregation on our reach-out to Hope Johnson from the UUA to help facilitate our healing process with the recent departure of Toniann. Hope asked us to take charge of the healing ourselves initially before she would want to come join us. We have already arranged (and many of you participated) in meetings and board meetings recently, and we are circling back to Hope to ask her opinion on what else we can be doing while also seeing if she would be willing to schedule time with us in the early fall.

We will update the congregation after our conversations with Hope. In the meantime, a reminder that Kim Palmer has made herself available for those looking to talk about recent events and emotions, and the Healthy Congregation Committee is also available for similar discussions.

Some good news, the board approved a 3% cost of living increase for the UUMAN staff. Also, Coffee Talk resumes after service Sunday, August 4, as some Board members will be available to discuss items of interest to the congregation.

Finally, UUMAN had (I think this is the right number) 19 participants in this year's July SUUSI event at Western Carolina University's campus. Another great event and we hope more members will join next year to make UUMAN's presence even stronger.

Every child went home with a birdhouse. The third week was all about cooking and the kids cooked up some after service delicacies for the congregation!





We also made lunches for the summer

MUST Ministry program and cloth t-shirt bags for NFCC. The kids went on a nature walk with Gus Hadorn and got all shook-up with Donna Melcher and John Pruitt.





There was also a water day and a car wash – the car wash raised over \$300 for the service project for "Standup for Kids" that will be done on August 4th.

This past Sunday – July 28th we learned about "Recipes for a Healthy Environment" led by Mike Chambers, Donna Guile, and Raffaella Shanahan. The kids learned about the greenhouse effect, composting, the "3Rs", and more. Raffaella Shanahan showed us some products which you can use to eliminate waste including: an alternative tooth paste so no tooth paste tube to throw away, a bamboo tooth brush that is compostable, a bees wax cover to replace plastic wrap, and a collapsible metal straw you can reuse over and over again!

Why am I putting my pronouns (she/her/hers) on my UUMAN badge?



In two words, it's welcoming. I hadn't thought much about my pronouns until I started working with the MCY council. They started their meeting check-ins with their names and pro-

nouns. I thought it was novel but still pretty unnecessary for me since I never had any trouble with anyone addressing me properly. That is a ME perspective.

Right now at UUMAN though is a time of intense learning and activity. Many things are visible that to us that may not have been before. One of these is about being truly welcoming for persons who are gender non-conforming, questioning, non-binary and transgender. When they see pronouns on name tags, it lets them know that you are more likely to respect their pronouns. It can help them feel more comfortable in putting their own pronouns on their name tags. This is a WE perspective.

There is a good YouTube video you can see here. I hope we can all do this. If it makes you uncomfortable you could ponder that for yourself. I didn't have time to find out the process for getting a new name tag before newsletter publication, but I called Suzy Lamoree (our administration helper) and let her know we might have more volume than normal.

Roswell Resolution of Respect

If you said, they are the members of Roswell clergy that showed up to the Roswell City Council meeting on July 29, 2019 to support a Roswell Resolution of Respect, you would be correct!

In December of 2018, a white nationalist group put up flyers in Roswell Square. According to Southern Poverty Law Center, this group recruits "college age men and indoctrinates them into a fashionable new face of white nationalism. Rather than denigrating people of color, this organization focuses on raising white racial consciousness and building community based on shared racial identity and intellectualizing white supremacist ideology."

The Resolution of Respect was drafted in response to these flyers and it amplifies the Roswell value of respect for each other. Dave Dunn rallied the Roswell Clergy to be at the meeting and Dillon and Kelly Callen and other members of Roswell congregations were there to support as well.

At the meeting, the resolution was read into the record by Rev Melanie Eyre of One World Spiritual Center. Mayor Lori Henry responded that she was concerned that by passing the resolution, it might actually draw hate activities to Roswell. However she further forcefully stated, "Please know that this is a city of respect. We respect all of our neighbors, all of our races and all of our faiths. I very rarely speak for this council but I will do it on this occasion and I can tell you that every single member of this council and our staff will not tolerate hate in this city and will not tolerate any targeting toward any group because we are inclusive of all of our neighbors and I want you all to know that. That is a commitment that each and every one of us have and we will not tolerate it."

This is a work in progress and we have started a conversation with the city that we hope will be productive. We will keep everyone informed as we go further.
