Possibility and Faith

Possibility is the sense that something could happen, and it is the ministry theme for the month of

January. I can imagine why Possibility was chosen for the first month of a new year; a month which may traditionally begin with planning, wishing, and a mind open to possibility. I love the idea of living in a mindset of possibility. Even a new day can bring many surprises that I never would have even thought were possibilities! Realistically, though I know certain things are not likely to happen. Somethings have an infinitely small chance of happening. This is where I begin to ponder *faith*.

I feel a little uneasy talking about faith. As I grew up, faith was spoken about as something separate from facts. When I had questions about biblical miracles, I was told to "just have a little faith." But as a Unitarian Universalist I have found that faith doesn't have to be supernatural. Recently I was re-reading *Tending the Flame: The Art of Unitarian Universalist Parenting* in which the author speaks of "believing in something we hope for but cannot be certain of." She speaks of how faith is not the facts we believe about religion but the core of how we search and find meaning in life. Of course my life has uncertainties but it also has profound hope for what can be. Hope for *possibilities*.

So as a Unitarian Universalist, I can't make a list of my "faith" and hand it to my child. I live in the mindset of possibility and I can show him how I find meaning in that way. But it is also important for him to be with others who believe in possibilities and live as though the future is not set. In the "extended family" that we connect with at church through Family Ministry, he sees even more people living with more possibilities than I could even imagine. He grows alongside other young people in hope as they define their own faith. He sees how we use our faith to guide our choices, how we face challenges, and how we act together in covenant.

The other thing I think of while pondering Possibility, as I add this image of an acorn, is how the young people of our church ARE Possibility in physical form. Our children are open to more possibilities in their lives than this acorn is. Can you see how this acorn is a symbol of the children of UUMAN and a symbol of possibilities? Family ministry is nurturing the family: "acorns", "oaks", and all possibilities!

India Celebration Pilgrimage - Feb. 2019

This February, my mother Valerie and I will be participating in the India Celebration Pilgrimage, organized by the UUPCC (Unitarian Universalist Partner Church Council). We will be visiting UUMAN's sister church in Mawsynjri in the Khasi Hills area of Northeast India. We will be there during the celebration of the 10th Anniversary of the founding of the Children's Village orphanage. We are also lucky to be meeting Rev. Catie Scudera from the First Parish Needham, MA, UU church, who will be leading the trip and who was one of the original founders of the Village.

The members of UUMAN had raised \$1,100 to sponsor a young adult to go on this trip. I am very grateful to be the recipient of this scholarship, and I am also very grateful to the UUPCC, which awarded an additional \$500 travel grant to offset my airline fees. As a student majoring in world languages and cultures at GSU and then Reinhardt University, I am excited to participate in this partnership and learn about this region of the world. I am also excited to further enrich our relationship with our sister church and I feel like I will learn a lot from meeting the community in Mawsynjri.

I am planning to do many activities with the children in the Village such as jewelry making, origami, and other art projects. I am also planning to learn some of the Khasi language and prepare a scrapbook about my family, UUMAN, and life in Georgia to show them. I would like to help with their gardening work or any other grounds projects there. UUMAN had recently raised money for a young man, Basharboy, in the Mawsynjri area to have a heart operation. Sadly, he had passed away before being able to have the operation. I hope to visit his family to give our condolences.
