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Where Can One Go To Get Help?

Last year, I participated in a poverty simulation sponsored by North Fulton Community Charities. It was an eye-opener. In the simulation, participants play specific roles, generally parent or child in a family

unit, and are given the resources that a family might have when living below the poverty line.

As part of the simulation, the participants are informed of social service agencies that can provide assistance. During the simulated week, the participants rush to and from their jobs (or participate in job searches), attend school, find time and transportation to go to the store, pawn shop, or bank.

To be clear, nobody does well in the simulation, but those who do the best take what little time they have to investigate the social service agencies that are available to them. At times, the network of agencies – who they are, what they do, whom they serve, the rules that they must adhere to – can be confusing and daunting to navigate; yet those who take that time to navigate this network fare better than those who don't.

I asked Barbara Duffy, the recently retired Executive Director of NFCC, if she had a resource list for those needing help. I believe this list is important enough to pass along you all. (Please do not hesitate to email me if you'd like for me to send you the list electronically.)


