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In the Interim: Minimalist Moments

Spiritual practice is not just sitting and meditating. Practice is looking, thinking, touching, drinking, eating, and talking. Every act, every breath, and every step can be practice and can help us to become more ourselves.

In my second year as interim minister in Macon, I moved from a tiny downtown apartment to a lovely whole house in Bonaire—south of Warner Robins if you're familiar with the map of Georgia. Bonaire is small and rural. The house was rural and big. A family of four had lived there comfortably. My late cat Isabel and I were a family of two. I adored having all that space, but my traveling possessions only began to fill it. There were a lot of rooms left over.

One day I had an idea. I turned the walk-in closet in my bedroom into a meditation cave.

A window flooded my "temple" with morning light. The wide entrance was doorless. I hung a scrim of sheer curtains there. My chair and altar—and therefore my face—were inches from a built-in shoe rack. Nevertheless, the effect was visually and spiritually stunning. I settled in to meditate. At once the day's work schedule played across what Buddhism would call my chattering "monkey mind". I gave myself weeks to overcome the interference, but a month later, my inner voice was still preoccupied with calendaring.

I admire friends who meditate regularly. Perhaps one day I will join them, although after years of trying, all the enlightenment I've attained is the repeated realization that I'm not cut out for sitting meditation. Nor walking meditation. I've tried that too. I kept tripping over Nothing. At the Graduate Theological Union Bookstore in Berkeley, there is little room on the shelves for leisure fiction. What's there has to count. Susan Howatch's series on angst in the Church of England from the 40s through the 70s was a favorite in my seminary days, combining theology, sex and capable writing in satisfying proportions. Episcopalian students were uniquely rewarded. They could study church history for the exam while thrilling to a juicy plot.

This is hardly a book recommendation. Howatch's Church of England series goes a long way toward explaining why religion in the UK is a tough sell these days. The focal character in each novel is a clergyman tormented by emotional and spiritual circumstances to such an extent that, to put it mildly, life isn't working out very well for him. Four hundred or so pages later, he's been hauled back from the brink and transformed, thanks to gifted spiritual direction.

Had Thich Nhat Hanh been the spiritual director, Susan Howatch's 400-pagers would have turned into brochures. There are trained spiritual directors skilled at guiding religious liberals.

I sought out a nearby spiritual director in my first interim when I learned she is a Unitarian Universalist. More regularly though, we UUs tend to be spiritual practice minimalists. You might meditate, pray, keep a journal, seek direction, or do something else to sustain your soul, but the key word in "spiritual practice" isn't spiritual. It's practice. Every act, every breath, and every step can be practice and can help us to become more ourselves. Every minimalist moment counts.

Ministerial Search Committee News You Can Use March 2016

Your Ministerial Search Committee (MSC) is pleased to provide you with another installment of News You Can Use—an update on what we've been up to. We are excited about our section on the new uuman.org website, where you can find the latest information about the search!

What has the MSC been doing?

Of the seven ministers who expressed interest in UUMAN, we have identified three "pre-candidates" whom we think and feel are the best fit for UUMAN, based on their Ministerial Records, websites, and other information.

Two of these pre-candidates have traveled to Georgia for weekend visits. Each of the two has been given a grand tour of the local area and a more formal interview. We have also observed each of them delivering a sermon at a "neutral pulpit". We have been asked to keep the identities of all pre-candidates confidential until one is selected over the others.

What will happen over the next couple of months?

We will continue our selection process by evaluating the third precandidate and checking additional references. We will then decide by consensus which of the three pre-candidates should be given an offer. This selected ministerial candidate will join us to lead the congregation in service and meet the various groups at UUMAN during the week of May 1 – May 8.

The congregation will then vote on May 8 to decide if they would like to ask the candidate to become our next settled minister—we will need 40% of our members to vote, and calling the minister will require a 90% affirmative vote of all those present. This will be your opportunity to affirm and promote the 5th Principle: the use of the democratic process within our congregation! So please mark your calendars to VOTE for the new minister on May 8!

The minister's start date will be negotiated with the Board, but will likely be in the fall of 2016.


