This strike, inspired by the Swedish16-year-old Greta Thunburg, was held around the world and led primarily by youth. In August 2018, Ms. Thunburg began skipping school to protest climate change and she has inspired others to do the same. Greta herself was inspired by the teenagers who had protested

gun violence after the Parkland shootings. (Nobody does anything alone ... ripples in a pond!)

Now, many of our young people at UUMAN are inspired! One of our religious education classes collected improperly disposed of single-use plastics and made hand-held art projects out of them. After Sunday service, the young ones had these on display as they lovingly agitated (i.e. chanted) for climate justice.

At the Global Climate Strike, many of the young people who spoke at the capitol urged us to become educated and familiar with the talking points of the Green New Deal. They urged us to think for ourselves and not accept mainstream media's interpretation of this legislation.

Global Climate Strike and the Green New Deal

The principal resolution, taken

is the duty of the Federal Govern-

ment to create a Green New Deal to:



Rep. Ocasio-Cortez

1. Achieve net-zero greenhouse gas emissions through a fair and just transition for all communities and workers;

2. Create millions of good, high-wage jobs and ensure prosperity and economic security for all people of the United States;

3. Invest in the infrastructure and industry of the United States to sustainably meet the challenges of the 21st century

4. Secure for all people of the United States for generations to come:

- Clean air and water
- Climate and community resiliency
- healthy food
- access to nature ۲
- ۲ a sustainable environment

5. Promote justice and equity by stopping current injustices and preventing future injustices, and repairing historic oppression of indigenous communities, communities of color, migrant communities, deindustrialized communities, depopulated rural communities, the poor, low-income workers, women, the elderly, the unhoused, people with disabilities, and youth (referred to in this resolution as "frontline and vulnerable communities").

So much rich work to do. May we be energized in service to our congregation, our community and our world!

Resolution of Respect



On Sept. 9, to the delight of the supporters pictured here, the Roswell City Council approved the Resolution of Respect! (See the <u>August UU Times</u> for a detailed description of the resolution.) This resolution was written in response to a hate group flyer that was



posted during the 2018 holiday season in the Roswell City Square and the general increase of hate group activity in our country. It affirms the core value of RESPECT for every person in the city and authorizes and encourages the Roswell Police department to act in the case of hate crimes.

Rev. Melanie Eyre (One World Spiritual Center) and Donna Melcher (UUMAN) met with our new Roswell Police Chief, James Conroy to discuss his department's readiness to deal with disrespectful and destructive actions toward targeted groups. Chief Conroy, who was the Chief of Police previously in Dekalb County, has a broad view and sadly plenty of experience with hate activities and was very open to our discussion about the resolution and various education opportunities available from the Southern Poverty Law Center on these groups.

Councilman Matt Tyser remarked that he was happy to cast his vote for the Resolution of Respect (which passed unanimously) and was looking forward to 'What's Next' for the city to encourage this value. I'd have to say that's a very good question because there are so many opportunities to show respect for each other in Roswell. What are your ideas?

What has the UUA Done for Us Lately?

You might be asking yourself, "What has the UUA done for UUMAN lately?" (while you hear Janet Jackson's song in the back of your head). I'm glad you're curious. Rev. Dr. Hope Johnson (and to a lesser extent, Kathy McGowan) from the UUA has been part of UUMAN's healing and transition process since June 20th, to be precise. As you may know, we had reached out to the UUA on June 7th, but the timing wasn't ideal for a quick response because of General Assembly. Since June 20th, the UUA has been supportive and extremely responsive.

We've had video calls every 2-3 weeks (for a total of 5 calls to date) and have exchanged many emails and some texts. Over the course of this process, I have trusted Hope and her wisdom. She's worked with many congregations over the years (including one for which she was the minister for 15 years), and she specializes in conflict resolution and multicultural congregational development.

The first piece of advice Hope offered, I didn't like at the time. I know many of you felt similarly. Hope said that we had work of our own to do before it made sense for her to visit the congregation. At the time, many of us had hoped she'd be able to heal UUMAN's chasm. But Hope stressed that the UUA cannot do the work for us. Conflict resolution (as imperfect at it as we are) is our work to do as a congregation. Hope said we needed "all hearts on deck" as we re-committed to the work of the church and that healing would happen while we worked together and processed feelings together. Specific work of the church we discussed with Hope included:

- Getting the MCY program up and running for the new church year
- Continuing the visioning process
- Celebrating the new church year (which led to a bigger celebration at the ribbon cutting than originally planned)

In subsequent calls, the board and Hope discussed that part of our healing process would also include the workshop planned by Social Justice Committee on Active Hope that I hope many of you attended on 9/29 and the survey on spiritual community satisfaction being developed by the Healthy Congregations Team (HCT) and the Committee on Shared Ministry (COSM). During our most recent call, Hope told us she will come to UUMAN at the right time, for the right reasons. She will also help us process survey responses, if we would like. We are hopeful that the survey responses can help guide what she offers, so please complete it once HCT and COSM send it to your in-box!! We've committed to being in a beloved community valuing love, courage, connection, justice, a sense of wonder and awe, and with transforming our world as our ultimate goal. Moving through conflict is a necessary part of being together, and UUMAN is becoming stronger for engaging in that workcan't you feel it?

sion, creating our vision and developing a strategic plan to keep us focused on our shared priorities.

Progress to date:

 Through 3 congregational meetings and 2 meetings with the youth, we identified 5 core values: wonder/awe, connection, love, courage, and justice, and we drafted a covenant, based on input from all of these meetings.

- The ME to WE workgroup is excited to finally be able to present draft versions of the mission and vision statements.


