The 8th Principle of Unitarian Universalism

Article II of the UUA Bylaws consists of the following:

SECTION C-2.1. PRINCIPLES - Seven Principles & Six Sources

SECTION C-2.2. PURPOSES - The UUA serves congregations; implement principles

SECTION C-2.3. INCLUSION - Welcome all by changing structures of oppression

SECTION C-2.4. FREEDOM OF BELIEF - No Unitarian Universalist creed

The UUA Bylaws also state that "If no study process of Article II has occurred for a period of fifteen years, the Board of Trustees shall appoint a commission to study Article II for not more than two years and to recommend appropriate revisions, if any, thereto to the Board of Trustees for inclusion on the agenda of the next regular General Assembly (UUA Bylaws, Article XV, Section C-15.1)."

Although there have been some minor adjustments to Article II over the years, it has essentially been unchanged since 1987.

In the Fall of 2020, an Article II Study Commission was appointed to review Article II. They are completing the "study" portion of their work and are beginning to put together recommendations to the UUA Board who will then place such recommendations on the agenda for voting approval at UUA General Assembly 2023. Amendments and modifications can (and likely will) be made at GA 2023. To fully modify Article II, a subsequent vote at GA 2024 will also need to take place.

Among other possible changes to Article II, the inclusion of an 8th Principle will likely be proposed. Although the wording may change somewhat, at this point the 8th principle is stated as follows (note that the principle itself begins with the word "Journeying." The "We, the member congregations..." portion is the preamble to the principles as a whole):

We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote: Journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions.

If you wish to discuss the latest developments regarding Article II Study Commission, Jennifer Ratcliffe will be hosting a 2nd Hour course entitled "**Issues in Unitarian Universalism**" which will be held on Sundays 10/9, 10/16 and 10/30.

Nurture our spirit. Strive for Justice. Transform the world.



Having served in the role of Treasurer for nearly 3 months now, I have a superb understanding of our financial situation (haha). The board and I thought that you too may be interested in where our money comes from and how it is spent, so allow me to share with you the inner workings of our financials.


As most of you know, each spring we embark upon our annual stewardship campaign where each member is asked to identify their financial pledge amount for the upcoming fiscal year. We are given information about what a Fair Share Contribution looks like and are asked to consider the four commitment levels and keep our UU values in the forefront when we make our pledge. Using the Fair Share guide, each member is asked to contribute 2-10% of their income to support our congregation. The Board uses these pledge amounts to create the budget and relies upon these financial promises to pay for expenses throughout the year.

Pledge dollars account for a whopping 71% of our revenue, but we also have a few other very important revenue streams. Rent, primarily from The Premo School, accounts for 17% of our revenue. The Harvest Moon auction (to be held on November 5ththis year) brings in at least 7%. Our plate collections on Sunday can bring in another 3% while other fundraising vehicles such as Amazon Smile, Kroger cards, Red bubble, Coffee House, Moravian Pies and art classes combine to contribute the final 2%.




"That's great!", you may say, but what is the money used for? Pledge and other revenue sources support our worship and music programs, our religious education program, programs for members and friends, community outreach, and connections to Unitarian Universalism.

Our budget reflects our mission by providing a place to NURTURE OUR SPIRIT, fair pay and benefits to our people as we STRIVE FOR JUSTICE, and support for our ministries as we TRANSFORM THE WORLD.



As we look a little more closely into these broad categories, we gain a little more insight about how our money is working for and supporting our vision of justice. All of this is made possible because of you and your contribution no matter how great or small.
