We developed an outreach program, leading singalongs for retirement communities where UU members, friends, and family members lived, as well as other underserved communities. We also performed for the occasional vespers service and other church events before the pandemic forced us online for much too long.

MUUsicShare at UUMAN will be a fun jam for music lovers of all ages and abilities. Will it evolve into something more? That's up to you. We hope to see you there!

UUMAN Goes Solar!

On July 28, Creative Solar installed solar panels on the roof of our Sanctuary.



Our solar array will produce 15,500 kWh/year and reduce our emissions by 18,100 lbs. of CO2. This is the equivalent of 900 gallons of gasoline. In addition, we will save over \$80,000 over the life of the system.



Your generosity has not only made us good stewards of UUMAN but also allowed us to put UUMAN on a path to be more sustainable. We will become the 8th church in Georgia to install solar panels and the 1st church north of Atlanta.

UUTheVote

"Good Trouble Congregation"

On July 17, 2022, approximately 20 UUMAN members and friends met in Fellowship Hall to discuss the UUTheVote campaign. The UUTheVote campaign is a non-partisan campaign of the UUA aimed at getting more voters to the polls on November 8, 2022.

The goal of the UUTheVote campaign is "a coordinated national movement of communities working together to fight for justice, accountability, and equity". There are many ways to get involved in the UUTheVote campaign including writing letters or postcards, texting or calling voters, door-to-door campaigning, registering voters and participating directly in the mid-term election.

On August 7th UUMAN held a Letter Writing Event, that many of you attended, it got us all inspired and headed in the right direction of becoming a "Good Trouble Congregation". Didn't you always want to get into good trouble? Well now is your opportunity!

In order to become a UUTheVote "Good Trouble" Congregation we have to do 4 of the following 7 things:

- Average 20 postcards or letters per member
- Average 200 text messages per member
- Average 20 calls per member
- Average 20 doorknocks per member
- Reach 20 percent volunteer engagement
- Average 2 newly registered voters per member
- At least 2 congregants are line warmers, poll workers, or poll watchers

The UUMAN UUTheVote Team believes we can reach 4 of these goals: Letters, Text/Calls, Volunteer Engagement and Poll worker/ watchers. In order to reach these goals though we need people to step forward and commit to - Letter Writing and/or Text/Calls (we'll help make it easy for you).

Some of My Best Friends

It's not always easy being a liberal in the South. In certain situations, like at work, you have to mind what you say, how much of yourself you reveal. The break room, for example, can be a dangerous place, when it's crowded and a certain orange ex-president is talking on CNN. It tests the limits of your poker face. Don't scowl or roll your eyes. You can bet how the majority of those upper managers voted.

Even if we could remain in our like-minded bubbles, is that really where we want to live? Does diversity and inclusion not extend to politics? If we reject people who don't share our political views, we're shutting out the majority of our neighbors. And probably a few family members. That doesn't seem to mesh with our principles. As UUs, we take it on faith that we should be respectful of other religions. But we have a hard time extending the same spirit of open-minded inclusiveness to those who think differently regarding politics.

There are limits to this spirit of acceptance, of course. I'm not talking about people pushing crazy QAnon theories or advocating violence, but legitimate policy differences. I wouldn't kick a friend to the curb because he believes in trickle-down economics, for example. (Despite all the evidence that it doesn't work.)

I have an old friend who is my opposite politically. When we talk, we don't always shy away from politics. Sometimes, we make each other mad. But we've learned how to ratchet the tension down. How to keep the discord compartmentalized. After the inevitable disagreement, which inevitably solves nothing, we seek common ground. How are the kids? Let's go fishing. We try to walk that line between being honest about our values and being considerate of the other's perspective. It's difficult—a constant struggle. I think they call it love.

Many of my family members are Conservatives. I can't turn my back on them or shut them out, just for that reason. With my brother, I've learned to not talk politics or religion at all. We just don't go there, by mutual, implicit agreement. We focus on things we both love—childhood memories, the Georgia Bulldogs, grilling. Somehow, we've intuited that that's the only way to preserve the peace. Perhaps most importantly, we know that our mom (another shared love) would have wanted it that way.

I realize that there are family members who wouldn't accept this sort of truce, who would keep pushing their agenda until your only choice would be to turn away. There is no simple answer for those situations. But I try to think twice before posting that political meme on Facebook. Before hitting Send on that impassioned email that is bound to widen the gulf, not bridge it. I'm not about to change the minds of certain friends and family, any more than they are going to change my mind. So I often hold my tongue. Some

would call such reticence cowardice. Maybe there can be a fine line between cowardice and kindness. "Be nice," my mom would admonish my brother and me, as she sent us off to school. Sometimes, nice is not the right play—sometimes you have to make a stand. But there are worse things than to err on the side of kindness. I choose my battles carefully, especially with the ones I love.

Spiritual Wisdom Studies

Spiritual Wisdom Studies is changing days to Sunday Evening

In an effort to be more convenient to those interested in participating, Spiritual Wisdom Studies is changing from Friday evening to Sunday evening 7-8:15 pm.

When UUMAN did our visioning with the UUA to work on our mission and vision, we had about a quarter of our congregation participate (50 people). Our top two values at the end of that workshop turned out to be #1: Wonder and Awe and #2: Connectedness. These were what UUMAN members valued most at that point in time. In Spiritual Wisdom Studies we try to choose books to study that relate to Wonder and Awe and Connectedness.

Our favorite book so far was Finding the Mother Tree by Suzanne Simard about her life story and lifelong research on how trees cooperate, communicate and support each other through an underground network of mycorrhizal fungi. We are now finishing up the book Before: Children's Memories of Previous Lives by Jim B. Tucker M.D. based on 60 years of research out of the University of Virginia on children aged 2-5 that report remembering previous lives.

We will start our next book on Sunday, September 25th and at the beginning of each new selection, we open our group to new participants. We will meet on the second and fourth Sundays from 7-8:15. The book we have chosen is Mindfulness: An Eight-Week Plan for Finding Peace in a Frantic World by Mark Williams and Danny Penman. There are meditations online to guide you through the weekly meditation practice spoken by one of the authors in a charming English accent. We will read the chapters, do the meditation practice and meet to discuss our experience. We will start with reading the first three chapters to discuss on September 25th, the meditation exercises start with chapter 4.
