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Metro Atlanta's Proposed Police Training Facility

You've likely heard about Atlanta City Council's and the Atlanta Police Foundation's wish to construct a state-of-the-art police

training facility in the nation's largest urban forest – right here in Metro Atlanta. You may have heard this training facility referred to as "Cop City."

This issue can be in inflection point, a cause for division amongst people (including our Unitarian Universalist congregations)...yet I believe it need not be.

This facility is merely a specialized response to address specific problems in our culture – culture that is unfortunately characterized by guns and violence. Yet our culture is also unfortunately characterized by many other problems – the marginalization of people economically, politically, socially, etc.; a justice system that doesn't work for everybody, for- profit prisons, income inequality, climate change, the erosion of our democracy, the undoing of women's rights and the targeting of LGBTQIA+ people, etc.

Looking closely, all of these unfortunate problems are part of an interconnected system (i.e. our culture) and I believe that the system as a whole needs to be looked at when proposing solutions to the specific problems of the system.

The Roswell Police routinely reach out to the local faith community and I've met Chief James Conroy on numerous occasions. Although I don't claim to know him well, he seems to be a respectful, stand-up individual who wants to serve Roswell as best he can. And although everyone has the right to feel about the police what they will, I believe that ultimately, how we "feel" about the police doesn't come into play when deciding whether this training facility is a good idea or a bad one.

Among other things, all agree that this facility will include a planned replica of an Atlanta city block with mock apartments and hotel rooms for police to practice raids and address active shooter scenarios.

I don't blame Atlanta City Council for their wanting the police to be trained. We need our officers to be trained. Yet, this type of training facility is a specialized response to specific problems we have going on in a much larger interconnected system (i.e. our culture). This proposed training facility is a specialized, escalatory response to the culture of guns and violence. Regardless of that specific problem, what we need over the long-term are holistic solutions to de-escalate, de-gun, de-tox the whole system; and I don't think the spirit of the proposed training facility will focus on that.

It is for these reasons that the Unitarian Universalist General Assembly in June passed an Action of Immediate Witness called "Rise Up to Stop Cop City" which says, in part:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT as Unitarian Universalists we recognize the momentum of collective action to demand social change and we call upon the UUA and its member congregations to Stop Cop City

We will take action through self-organized ... campaigns...and other solidarity actions.

We will support those engaged in direct action to Stop Cop City with spiritual and material resources

Nurture our spirit. Strive for Justice. Transform the world.

What You Need To Know About the UUMAN Podcast



Did you know that UUMAN has a podcast? It's easy to find, just enter UUMAN into your favorite site-Apple, Google, Spotify, Podbean, etc.

Please check it out - LIKE IT - rate it, and share it with friends. The podcast is a carefully edited version of our weekly services and an occasional "bonus" episode. The UUMAN podcast is another way for UUMAN to reach a larger audience.

Where did the hymns go? What about that amazing cover version of "____"?

UUMAN takes its legal obligations seriously. We cannot include copyright-protected music in a downloadable podcast format. Therefore, you'll probably not hear a worship associate say "please rise and turn to page 327 in your hymnal," since most of these musical arrangements fall under the category of protected content. Likewise, a cover version of another songwriter's efforts will not be included.

Thankfully there are exceptions to this rule. Our talented Music Director Alex Pietsch composes original musical pieces which he contributes to UUMAN. These are made available for download with his permission, so a typical podcast episode does include a substantial amount of musical content. We have on occasion secured the permission of songwriters from outside the congregation, and included this music, as well. Also, if you've read this far, and are a songwriter yourself who'd like to have their compositions included in service, great! Contact Alex Pietsch to see if such material could find use in the future.

Why a pod? What's in a pod?

From October 23, 2001 through May 10, 2022, Apple manufactured a device called the "iPod." This device spawned a genuine revolution in audio distribution among music, news, and commentary listeners. Prior to the iPod's release, these listeners relied on either terrestrial AM or FM broadcasts or their own personally downloaded digital music files, played back on a variety of competing hardware formats.

While the iPod has been replaced in the hearts and minds of its former users with the iPhone (or sometimes a 'Droid, but not usually-it's just most of the planet who use Android devices, as opposed to Americans with money and influence), it's the "pod" that lingers in this transportable audio in our collective ears.

Adult Religious Education Committee Activities, UUMAN: Is this a good fit for you?

Rollin Mathis has done an amazing job of getting second hour Adult Education started at UUMAN. He is stepping down from his coordinator role, creating an opportunity for congregants interested in Adult Education. As the committee has grown and the classes have become quite popular, we are looking to create a committee to replace Rollin. He has outlined the work to be done by that committee in a memo, which I am sharing with all of you. If you are interested in working on Adult Education at UUMAN, please let Dave Dunn know.

Shelley, you asked me to address the duties and activities of the adult RE coordination during my tenure, which began in summer 2018 and ended June 2023. Those activities evolved over time due to such changes as the introduction of 2nd hour programming; transition to Breeze for calendaring, attendance, and email communication; and changes in the membership of the committee. I anticipate that the activities and duties will continue to change so please consider this memo to be for purposes of institutional knowledge and not a fixed checklist of committee duties. Most important will be the composition of the committee. Since we are volunteers, the activities will reflect the interests, skills, and time constraints of the committee members. This transition is an opportunity to reimagine the activities & duties of the committee.

Class management and content: We currently offer three types of classes: (1) 2nd hour programming, (2) ongoing classes that meet outside of 2nd hour, and (3) special offerings by other ministries such as social justice and earth ministry. The special offerings by other ministries are independent of the adult RE committee, although we coordinate space and time issues. For 2nd hour and ongoing classes outside of 2nd hour, individual facilitators determine the content and management style of the classes; this is not done by the adult RE committee. The adult RE committee assists with communication and administrative matters, described below.

Communication: This is the primary role of the committee: to act as an information clearing house. The committee does not manage the internal operation of the classes; the individual facilitators handle that. This communication includes, but is not limited to:

1) Fielding questions sent to adultenrichment@uuman.org (or such other address as the communications team may devise, given the concerns about the "enrichment" label);

- 2) Fielding questions from facilitators, such as room assignment, signup procedures, monitor availability, space & time conflicts:
- 3) Speaking with visitors about small group programming (I can continue to do this on an unofficial basis);
- 4) Speaking about adult education at UU101 (I can continue to do this on an unofficial basis);
- 5) Reporting to the Program Council;

Administrative procedures:

- 1) Space assignments: Currently Dave is assigning class space, since he has an overview of all the programming, including groups that might not fall under adult education.
- 2) Attendance: Individual facilitators take attendance and log it into Breeze or select someone to handle Breeze for that class.
- 3) Calendaring: This is done by communications with input from the course facilitators. Communications has expressed a desire to have the facilitators do this, so this can be worked out between the adult RE committee, the individual facilitators, and communications. At the very least, the facilitators would need to initiate the process by providing time and class description information.

Outreach: Currently, communications handles this in the online world and I have only done this in person with visitors; however, if the new committee has members with the appropriate interests and skill sets, online outreach would be a major new opportunity for the committee to expand its impact.
